PEAC Policies and Procedures

- 1. PEAC does not purchase birds, even to remove them from bad situations.
- PEAC will accept birds donated to our organization.
- PEAC does not breed birds or place any birds into breeding situations.
- PEAC does not adopt birds to children.
- 5. Potential adopters of small birds are required to attend our "Avian Basic Care" seminar.
- 6. Potential adopters of medium to large birds are required to attend at least the following three seminars: "Avian Basic Care," "Parrot Personalities," and "Behavioral Problems."
- 7. Potential adopters will receive a copy of our adoption application after attending the required seminars.
- All potential adopters will receive a home visit performed by one of our volunteers before being approved for adoption.
- 9. Approved adoption applications will be placed on a waiting list if a bird is not currently in our system that would be a good match for the approved adopter.
- 10. Only one parrot acquisition/adoption per home or PEAC membership is allowed in an 18-month time period.
- 11. Adopters are required to pay an adoption fee and reimburse PEAC for veterinary fees the bird may have incurred.
- 12. Adopted birds are to remain in the home and be treated as a member of the family.
- 13. Adopted birds may not be sold, given away, bred, or used for any type of monetary purposes.
- 14. After attending the mandatory seminars, those wishing to adopt a first-time large bird, such as an Amazon, African Grey, Cockatoo, or Macaw, will be required to spend hands-on time with the species of their choice under supervision of one of our volunteers before being approved.
- 15. As a general rule, we will not place a Cockatoo, Macaw, or other noisy bird in an apartment or condominium.
- 16. PEAC will not adopt birds as companions to other birds.
- 17. PEAC does not place birds into aviary situations.
- 18. Birds must remain in a 100% smoke-free environment.

Polo is a DNA-sexed male Red-lored Amazon who came to us after living in his first home for 20 years. In spite of living in an under-sized cage with minimal stimulation or interaction with people for a number of years, in just 9 days after coming to us, he began to step up and solicit head scratches! He is very gentle, watches the cats closely, and is responding well to positive reinforcement training. He does not appear to have a gender preference toward people. A true Amazon, he eats a wide variety of foods, and came to us on a good quality pelleted diet. Overall, he is very quiet, but he does a lovely variety of whistles, as well as several phrases in very clear speech.

Yes, we still need volunteer help: April has graciously taken on the positions of Adoption and Brid Intake Coordinator, and recruit a second person for Volunteer Coordinator. Of course, being responsible for not only our volunteers but also our foster homes, the Volunteer Coordinator will work handin-hand with April and very closely with the rest of the Leadership Team, as well. We are also still in need of foster volunteers — we finally whittled our waiting list down to just one brid, and then two more were immediately accepted onto the list (not to mention the 20–50 birds in need who we have to turn away each month).

By the way, in case we didn't mention it before, PLAC had a very successful booth at the Parrots International Symposium last May, which gave us the chance to reunite with seve

Yes, Virginia, PEAC Does Need More Foster Homes!

PEAC San Diego and PEAC Anchorage still have an incredible need for foster homes. Who's on our waiting list? In San Diego, we had just whittled our waiting list down to one bird, when we received several new applications from people wanting to give theirs up. With unemployment benefits running out for many people, surely the coming months will be filled with a new surge of people needing to relinquish their parrot companions. What can we do? How can we say no to these poor birds in such great need? Desperate people who are unwilling or unable to wait for their birds to move up our waiting list and into our program can end up selling or giving their birds to yet another parrot-clueless person, and in a year or so, the bird will be in another unwanted situation, with perhaps additional behavioral problems. Some people will even go so far as to the euthanize the pet parrot that they consider a "problem" when they "can't" wait any longer for an opening to become available in our program.

We still continue to receive large numbers of calls and emails from people wanting to relinquish parrots to our adoption program, and we are still turning away, on average, 20 parrots each month, just in San Diego, due to a surfeit of foster families.

Our foster birds come to your home pre-vet-checked and usually pre-quarantined by us. During their initial 30-day quarantine period in the home of one of our most experienced volunteers, each bird is evaluated for personality and behavior traits, to help us place it with the best possible foster match. We also evaluate your lifestyle and personality and your comments with respect to what species and personality type you think would be best

for you, to ensure that the bird that we think can best succeed Sometimes we do such a good the foster parent ends up call this "backfiring"? Because it opening in our foster parent love, and we can't always help

PEAC provides our foster homes with an appropriate cage, a playstand when possible, a travel carrier, TOPS organic pellets, an initial batch of toys and later replacement toys whenever available, and all the support you could ever ask for. All you need to supply is treats, fruits, veg, and pasta; varying degrees of patience; and a whole lotta love.

You may be able to save a life this holiday season.







DIRECTOR 'S MESSAGE:

As the days get shorter, darker, and colder we find that our parrots, not being able to get outside, start looking for ways to get into mischief. Whether it's shredding the phonebook, "customizing" the new window trim you just installed, or hacking into your computer to order toys online (you know who I'm talking about...yeah, Parker...I'm talking about YOU!), this is the time of year when we can all use a refresher course on enrichment. It seems like such a



big word, but really the smallest things can be enriching to our birds. I could fill pages with suggestions and tips, but there's no need to reinvent the wheel. Since I've been getting a number of calls and emails regarding consultations for enrichment, I decided I would put forth some reminders about what's already out there for your perusal – for free in many cases, or at least minimal cost.

For immediate, inexpensive and creative ideas at your fingertips, check out the

Parrot Enrichment Activity Books by Kris Porter. We've mentioned them before, but it's information worth repeating. Volumes 1 and 2 are available by download (for FREE!) from several locations, but why not go to the source?

You can also become of fan of Parrot Enrichment - Kris Porter on FaceBook and receive additional tips and suggestions.

For foraging, I highly recommend the "Captive Foraging" DVD by Dr. M. Scott Echols (available from several sources online).

These are just two examples; you can find many, many more if you spend the time looking. PEAC holds toy-making seminars from time to time, as well as a seminar specifically on Environmental Enrichment. Watch our upcoming seminar announcements and register early so you don't miss out on these great learning opportunities!

What are some of the toy or food enrichment ideas that you've done for your bird(s)? Go to our FaceBook page and post your ideas, or send us an email and we'll try to compile all the suggestions for a future newsletter segment.

Stay warm, be creative, and be thankful you don't have bears at home; they're a whole other can of worms when it comes to "enrichment"!!

THE "CHICKEN" MEMORIAL SPONSORSHIP PROGRAM

Chicken, a "Festive Amazon" (Amazona festiva) was imported in about 1970, as an adult, wild-caught bird. He was first owned by an elderly woman, a chain smoker, who had him for about 15 years and taught him to be a phenomenal talker. When she passed away, Chicken was left to her two sons, neither of whom liked him, and they kept him in isolation. Their sister rescued Chicken and gave him to a vet tech at the hospital where he was a client. The tech kept Chicken for a few years, until becoming engaged to someone who was allergic. In 1993, she called Layne Dicker, who was doing bird adoptions; Layne immediately fell in love with Chicken. He says that Chicken was affectionate, personable, and completely trustworthy. He would sit on Layne's shoulder for an hour with his head down getting scratched, and if Layne stopped, he'd nibble at his ear, making a little growling sound. In 1998, Chicken died of lung cancer. Layne has never completely gotten over it.

Letter from the Director, Pittsburgh Chapter

Hello, PEAC!

"My name is Scott Reichert. It is very exciting to be able to address you as the newly appointed Director of the Pittsburgh Chapter. I succeed Christy Kaufmann upon her retirement. In so doing I have quite a reputation to follow. I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Board of Directors for selecting me to lead our organization's mission into the future. My primary goal is to follow the original mission laid out for PEAC by the founder, Bonnie Kenk: to educate the public about responsible companion bird care and ownership. I hope to be able to transcend personalities and focus on solidifying our national ties. I also want to remove any perception of PEAC as a "secret society", to make its operation more transparent and to bring it into the vernacular.

"PEAC is a professional volunteer organization. In so being it is absolutely dependent on its volunteers! He is well educated, and has spent over thirty years as an educator himself.

What's New for 2011? By Scott Reichert, Pittsburgh Director

We are revamping our educational seminars. "How are we revamping them," you ask? In a few ways. The number one reason I have heard, that people aren't attending the seminars, is that they are too far away. We are answering this challenge by adding seminars in the East. We will now be giving six seminars in the North Huntington area, which are proposed to be held Friday evenings at the Norwin Public Library. We would like to start this in February. When it is firmed up, we will have definite details posted on our website, and advertising in place.

The second most common reason given is that the same content is repeated in multiple seminars. To answer this, we are in discussion with our other chapters about consolidating the number of core curriculum courses taught. This will free up resources to be able to teach more elective classes. Additionally, we are discussing changing the format. More participation and feedback will be encouraged, real birds will be utilized for demonstrative purposes, and suggestions for topics are welcome. There will be an open 30 minutes at the beginning of each seminar for guided discussion by one of our volunteers. In case anybody didn't catch it, I will repeat it once more: we are discussing reducing the core curriculum courses to once a year in the eastern location and once a year in the southern location. This may initially seem like a bad choice. After all, won't this hamper our adoptive processes? No it won't, because of the really exciting news. PEAC-Pittsburgh is partnering with the National Aviary to teach our core curriculum courses every month! Every, single, month we will have a core curriculum course taught at the Aviary. The first month and every other month thereafter (i.e. Jan, Mar, May, July...), the Aviary will teach a "Basic Care and Behavior Problem" course. The alternating months (Feb, Apr, Jun...), there will be an "Enrichment" course. These two sessions will serve in lieu of our "Basic Care" and "Behavior Problem" courses for the purposes of adoption requirements. (We have also proposed to the other chapters that The "Parrot Personalities" course be given on a personal level during the home interview process.) The courses will be taught by Cathy Schlott, the Director of Animal Training, with some of the birds coming from the Aviary's show. We will have volunteers present to answer questions, distribute literature and promote our organization. There will be a nominal charge for this (PEAC and Aviary members will receive a discount). However, this charge also includes admission to the Aviary for the entire day, including their new and improved indoor bird show. In addition to this Steve Sarro, Director of Animal programs and Cathy Schlott, Manager of Animal Training at the Aviary have agreed to speaking engagements for us. This is an outstanding opportunity for PEAC to partner with an organization that is respected nationally as well as internationally. We thank the National Aviary for considering us in this endeavor and hope this partnership will prove to be beneficial for all of us well into the future.

We have also joined with Rus Tyson of Ohio Bird Fairs. Rus organizes several bird fairs in Pennsylvania. We will have a presence at these events to distribute literature and answer questions and offer the adoption alternative. Rus has agreed to donate 100% of raffle and concessions proceeds to PEAC as well as many in-kind donations. Thank you, Rus!

I am sure many new things will arise in the next year to challenge our ability to provide the best in education about companion bird care, and careful, thoughtful re-homing of unwanted birds. However, as a team, with your support, I am confident we can meet those challenges and grow this organization, one day at a time, one step at a time. –SR
