# PEAC Policies and Procedures

- 1. PEAC does not purchase birds, even to remove them from bad situations.
- 2. PEAC will accept birds donated to our organization.
- 3. PEAC does not breed birds or place any birds into breeding situations.
- 4. PEAC does not adopt birds to children.
- 5. Potential adopters of small birds are required to attend our "Avian Basic Care" seminar.
- 6. Potential adopters of medium to large birds are required to attend at least the following three seminars: "Avian Basic Care," "Parrot Personalities," and "Behavioral Problems."
- 7. Potential adopters will receive a copy of our adoption application after at tending the required seminars.
- 8. All potential adopters will receive a home visit performed by one of our volunteers before being approved for adoption.
- 9. Approved adoption applications will be placed on a waiting list if a bird is not currently in our system that would be a good match for the approved adopter.
- 10. Only one parrot acquisition/adoption per home or PEAC membership is allowed in an 18-month time period.
- 11. Adopters are required to pay an adoption fee and reimburse PEAC for veterinary fees the bird may have incurred.
- 12. Adopted birds are to remain in the home and be treated as a member of the family.
- 13. Adopted birds may not be sold, given away, bred, or used for any type of monetary purposes.
- 14. After attending the mandatory seminars, those wishing to adopt a first-time large bird, such as an Amazon, African Grey, Cockatoo, or Macaw, will be required to spend hands-on time with the species of their choice under supervision of one of our volunteers before being approved.
- 15. As a general rule, we will not place a Cockatoo, Macaw, or other noisy bird in an apartment or condominium.
- 16. PEAC will not adopt birds as companions to other birds.
- 17. PEAC does not place birds into aviary situations.
- 18. Birds must remain in a 100% smoke-free environment.





# AWW, C'MON...HELP WANTED!

PEAC San Diego and PEAC Anchorage still have an incredible need for foster homes. Who's on our waiting list? In San Diego, we had <u>just</u> whittled our waiting list down to one bird, when we received several new applications from people wanting to give theirs up. With the economy still in the dumps and people losing their homes, the coming months will continue to reveal new people needing to relinquish their parrot companions.

What can we do? How can we say no to these poor birds in such great need? Desperate people who are unwilling or unable to wait for their birds to move up our waiting list and into our program can end up selling or giving their birds to yet another parrot-clueless person, and in a year or so, the bird will be in another unwanted situation, with perhaps additional behavioral problems. Some people will even go so far as to the euthanize the pet parrot that they consider a "problem" when they "can't" wait any longer for an opening to become available in our program.

We still continue to receive large numbers of calls and emails from people wanting to relinquish parrots to our adoption program, and we are still turning away, on average, 20+ parrots each month, just in San Diego, due to a surfeit of foster families.

Our foster birds come to your home pre-vet-checked and usually pre-quarantined by us. During their initial 30-day quarantine period in the home of one of our most experienced volunteers, each bird is evaluated for personality and behavior traits, to help us place it with the best possible foster match. We also evaluate your lifestyle and personality and your comments with respect to what species and

personality type you think the bird we are placing with you with you as its foster parent. this that it backfires, and the bird! Why do we call this closes up one opening in our love is love, and we can't always

PEAC provides our foster homes with an appropriate cage, a playstand when possible, a travel carrier, TOPS organic pellets, an initial batch of toys and later replacement toys whenever available, and all the support you could ever ask for. All you need to supply is treats, fruits, veg, and pasta; varying degrees of patience; and a whole lotta love.



# THE "CHICKEN" MEMORIAL SPONSORSHIP PROGRAM

Chicken, a "Festive Amazon" (Amazona festiva) was imported in about 1970, as an adult, wild-caught bird. He was first owned by an elderly woman, a chain smoker, who had him for about 15 years and taught him to be a phenomenal talker. When she passed away, Chicken was left to her two sons, neither of whom liked him, and they kept him in isolation. Their sister rescued Chicken and gave him to a vet tech at the hospital where he was a client. The tech kept Chicken for a few years, until becoming engaged to someone who was allergic. In 1993, she called Layne Dicker, who was doing bird adoptions; Layne immediately fell in love with Chicken. He says that Chicken was affectionate, personable, and completely trustworthy. He would sit on Layne's shoulder for an hour with his head down getting scratched, and if Layne stopped, he'd nibble at his ear, making a little growling sound. In 1998, Chicken died of lung cancer. Layne has never completely gotten over it.

PEAC has set up a memorial fund to help homeless birds with stories like Chicken's. But we can't do this without your help. Just one of our Amazons or macaws requires a new \$20 or \$30 toy at least once a month, in addition to the food costs. And we have numerous birds of all sizes waiting to enter our program! We are appealing to you as a fellow parrot lover to help us help these homeless birds. Please consider enrolling in our \$ponsorship Program. For a monthly contribution you can sponsor one or more of our birds. In return you will receive the satisfaction of knowing that a parrot's life was enriched by your donation, and your name will appear, if you wish, on our \$ponsorship List in our quarterly newsletter. ## DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE:

What is it with people these days?? Several days ago Anchorage had two arrests for animal cruelty; yes, two arrests in one day. One case involved a man living in an unheated connex container while his 20



cats (including one mama cat and her kittens) were living in his car. The temperature has been -10 to -15 below at night. At noon, the temperature in the car with the cats was -5. Cold temps also played a role in the second arrest. A maintenance technician was called in to repair the heating system in an apartment in Eagle River. According to the news accounts, the filthy apartment contained over 30 dogs many in stacked kennels with fecal matter dripping down onto the kennels below - and over

40 parakeets. Some of the birds were loose in the apartment, and there eggs in the bottoms of the cages and elsewhere.

Today I see where someone in Abilene, TX was arrested for stabbing his puppy (11-week old puppy!) 11 times and then throwing it away in a dumpster. Miraculously that puppy is still alive and is likely to survive its ordeal. Then there's the man in El Cajon, CA who beat his puppy so severely it had to be euthanized.

I'm sorry, humanity....but WTF??

Compared to the stories of abject cruelty and abuse, the guy living in the connex container seems like a saint. Even though he seemingly couldn't afford to rent a hotel or an apartment, he was trying to care for his pets (food and water were in the connex, and he would run the heat in his car from time to time to try to keep it warm enough for the cats). We don't know his story yet, but it seems he was sort of making an effort - a lame one - but an effort nonetheless. Cruelty was cited due to the subzero weather, not because they were living in filth and excrement. The owner of the connex admitted to letting the guy stay there, and admitted that he wouldn't allow the cats inside because he was concerned about odor...so I find his actions suspect as well. Odor? Really? I'm thinking living creatures potentially freezing to death is a bigger issue but, hey, that's just me. Of course the reality here is that no matter how one looks at it, no one should be living out of a car with 20 cats regardless of the time of year unless the car is an H3 or a stretch limo and comes with a mini fridge full of tuna and about a half dozen litter boxes.

I suppose one could say that 20 cats in a car is about the equivalent of 30 dogs in an apartment. The difference here, at least to me, is the two guys with the apartment were "pooping in their own nest" so to speak. THEY were living in that filth too...at least I assume they lived there based on the news. I have to wonder, how can someone be that lazy/ oblivious/uncaring/insert your own adjective here?

Through word of mouth, PEAC has become widely known. With this notoriety comes an increase in the number of birds needing our help. The increased volume of birds coming through our door has placed an additional financial burden on the organization. Just one of our macaws requires a \$20-\$30 toy at least once a month, in addition to the food costs (and thanks to the difficult times we are facing, food costs have risen dramatically). Sadly, we have numerous parrots of all sizes, needing food and a variety of toys, waiting to enter our program.

We are appealing to you as a fellow parrot lover to help us help these homeless birds. Please consider enrolling in our sponsorship program. For a monthly contribution, you can sponsor one or more of our birds. # Letter from the Director, Pittsburgh Chapter

### Dear PEAC Members:

Hello and Happy New Year! It seems like just yesterday that I was writing this article for my first time, for 2011. Time flies when you're having fun (get it, flies, it's a bird pun...).

I have learned a lot in the past year. We started off with a bang last year by introducing a new partnership with the National Aviary. This relationship has been working well and we intend on furthering it. We have changed the curriculum to offer three courses now. The first will be a basic care and behavior problem class that deals specifically with the three major problems encountered with companion birds: biting, screaming, and feather picking. The second will be an enrichment course where one can learn to create D-I-Y affordable items to enrich your bird's captive lifestyle. The new, third class will examine more intense training techniques, trick training, and will even touch on indoor flight training for your bird. The fee structure has been changed to \$15.00 for members and \$18.00 for non-members. This reduction should make it more accessible. The National Aviary has also agreed to more actively promote adoption as an alternative for pet bird acquisition through their "Wings!" bird show and we are currently seeking support for a semi-permanent display by the lorikeet exhibit promoting adoption, and PEAC specifically.

Last year we also tried some new locations for classes which, by attendance statistics, proved successful. This year we will not only offer these new locations, but we will be offering seminars on Sunday and at varying times to facilitate more people's schedules. We will be adding a couple moderated round table discussions to our seminar list as well as bringing back a popular "Ask the Vet" seminar. Although penguins aren't psittacines, we do have the advantage of having the eminent, worldwide African Penguin expert on our Board of Directors, and he has agreed to speak on this subject and answer questions (and you may even get an experience with a real penguin!...no promises though). The seminar will be free with a purchased aviary admission. There's much more to come and I am sure we will keep adding. Keep an eye on our website!




