She had been a good reminder of what companion parrot owners experience when faced with a very annoying and challenging problem. It can be very frustrating. Oddly enough, when I walk into someone else's home and hear screaming birds I am usually not affected. # PEAC Policies and Procedures

- 1. PEAC does not purchase birds, even to remove them from bad situations.
- 2. PEAC will accept birds donated to our organization.
- 3. PEAC does not breed birds or place any birds into breeding situations.
- 4. PEAC does not adopt birds to children.
- 5. Potential adopters of small birds are required to attend our "Avian Basic Care" seminar.
- 6. Potential adopters of medium to large birds are required to attend at least the following three seminars: "Avian Basic Care," "Parrot Personalities," and "Behavioral Problems."
- 7. Potential adopters will receive a copy of our adoption application after attending the required seminars.
- 8. All potential adopters will receive a home visit performed by one of our volunteers before being approved for adoption.
- 9. Approved adoption applications will be placed on a waiting list if a bird is not currently in our system that would be a good match for the approved adopter.
- 10. Only one parrot acquisition/adoption per home or PEAC membership is allowed in an 18-month time period.
- 11. Adopters are required to pay an adoption fee and reimburse PEAC for veterinary fees the bird may have incurred.
- 12. Adopted birds are to remain in the home and be treated as a member of the family.
- 13. Adopted birds may not be sold, given away, bred, or used for any type of monetary purposes.
- 14. After attending the mandatory seminars, those wishing to adopt a first-time large bird, such as an Amazon, African Grey, Cockatoo, or Macaw, will be required to spend hands-on time with the species of their choice under supervision of one of our volunteers before being approved.
- 15. As a general rule, we will not place a Cockatoo, Macaw, or other noisy bird in an apartment or condominium.
- 16. PEAC will not adopt birds as companions to other birds.
- 17. PEAC does not place birds into aviary situations.
- 18. Birds must remain in a 100% smoke-free environment.

You must h valso show proof that you have an adequate  $^{\psi}$  cage and are acquainted with an avian vet-  $^{\wedge}$ erinarian before taking your bird home. Adopted birds may not be bred, sold, given " away or used for any type of monetary purposes! ## PEAC San Diego Still Needs Volunteers!

PEAC is still in great need of foster homes for our program birds, We currently have a bird who has been #1 on our waiting list for a year; our current foster homes are still maxed out; and we need volunteers to take some of our current birds so that they can get the attention they need and deserve without "burning out" their current foster parents. We also continue to receive large numbers of calls and emails from people wanting to relinquish parrots to our adoption program, and had five in one day on a recent Saturday. We are still seeking help with the following positions:

Foster Volunteers: We need trained and qualified foster help so that we can help the many birds on our waiting list Please consider helping us provide a safe, loving, temporary home for a bird in need. PEAC provides caging, toys, and pellets for our foster birds, and our foster volunteers join our loyal and supportive volunteer team. Perhaps you cannot accommodate a large cage and play gym, but could help with a smaller bird, such as a conure. Of course, our birds will come to you well vetted to ensure the safety of your own birds.

Adoption Coordinator: This individual will work closely with our Volunteer Coordinator, Foster Volunteers, and Adoption Committee members to identify potential permanent homes for our foster birds.

**Volunteer Coordinator**: This person will work with our Director and Operations Manager to coordinate all volunteer activities, including reviewing potential volunteer applications, conducting orientations, placing birds into appropriate foster homes, and providing ongoing support to volunteers.





#### Poicephalus - Senegal Name: Sassy



In last issue's installment, we met Kazoo just as he was diagnosed with diabetes. Jean's research failed to turn up much information about diabetes in parrots, but she changed his diet, started him on a diabetes medication, Glipizide, and saw his weight stabilize and his energy level and great little personality return.

He isn't as active as he used to be, but is always willing to come out and get a head rub and visit for a while. In the morning he is always anxious to come out and get his first drink from a glass of water I keep just for him. I take him and my Timneh into the bathroom when I take a shower, and they keep me company. They don't want to get wet; they just hang out and get head rubs.

I am very hopeful that Kazoo's current health will continue, and even improve. Having a parrot with diabetes is challenging and has taught me to look more closely at what I feed my flock.

#### KAZOO'S CORNER

Installment 2: Wherein our little Kazoo suffers a setback but bounces back.

I took Kazoo back to the vet in January, as he was acting lethargic and throwing up constantly. I had to take him to a different vet clinic, because my regular vet was out of the country.

The new vet took blood and gave Kazoo fluids and an injection for the vomiting. I took him home, and even though he wasn't throwing up anymore, he was losing weight and not eating well. The tests came back all normal, except, of course, his glucose. About a week later he started vomiting again, so back to the vet we went. By this time, he was really in bad shape. He had lost so much weight that his breastbone showed, and he sat around with his eyes closed all the time. The vet suggested testing him for everything and anything the lab could test for. Without even considering the cost, I said yes. They drew blood again and gave Kazoo more fluids and another injection for vomiting, and home we went.

It took several days to get most of the test results back, and everything came back normal, which was good, but mystifying, because something besides the diabetes had to be going on. A day or so later, we received more test results, one of which was positive for *Giardia*. I don't know how he got it, and none of my other birds showed any symptoms. A prescription was called in to a local compounding pharmacy, and I got enough to treat all of my birds, just in case. Kazoo took the antibiotic for three weeks, and started improving almost immediately.

I took him back for a recheck three weeks later, and the vet put him on Metformin for his diabetes, in addition to the Glipizide. I crush both pills and put them in a liter of water that I keep in the frig just for him.

At present, Kazoo is holding his weight between 181 and 193 grams. He was on Harrison's pellets when he first became ill, but doesn't want them now, preferring Zupreem fruit-flavored. He is eating very well, and I keep a close eye on his behavior, since that is a good indication of his physical state. (*continued on left*)

# THE "CHICKEN" MEMORIAL SPONSORSHIP PROGRAM

He was first owned by an elderly woman, a chain smoker, who had him for about 15 years and taught him to be a phenomenal talker. Their sister rescued Chicken and gave him to a vet tech at the hospital where he was a client. The tech kept Chicken for a few years, until becoming engaged to someone who was allergic. In 1993, she called Layne Dicker, who was doing bird adoptions; Layne immediately fell in love with Chicken. He says that Chicken was affectionate, personable, and completely trustworthy. He would sit on Layne's shoulder for an hour with his head down getting scratched, and if Layne stopped, he'd nibble at his ear, making a little growling sound. In 1998, Chicken died of lung cancer. Layne has never completely gotten over it.
